- The candidate should be a citizen of India.
- He/She should be practising as an Advocate in India or qualified to be admitted as an Advocate under the Advocates Act, 1961.
- The age should not be more than 32 years on the 1st day of January of the year in which the applications for appointment are invited, i.e., 01.01.2023.

Delhi Judicial Services Mains Syllabus 2023

Moving on to the Delhi Judiciary Exam Mains, the second exam stage. It is an essay type with a total score of 850 marks. The Mains DJS syllabus includes four papers, each covering many topics:

General Legal Knowledge & Language

Section 1- General Knowledge

The questions in this section are designed to test your knowledge of current legal affairs.

Section 2 - Language (Essay, Translation, and Precis Writing)

- The Delhi Judiciary Exam Language Paper (English) is designed to evaluate your knowledge and proficiency in English language skills.

Civil Law I

In this paper of 200 marks, the questions are based on the following topics:

Criminal Law

In the criminal law paper, you will be tested on the following topics:

- The Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973
- The Indian Penal Code
- The Indian Evidence Act of 1872
- The Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005
- The Negotiable Instruments Act of 1881
- The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013
- The Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015

Viva Voce Syllabus

- The Viva-voce interview tests your knowledge of current legal affairs and your understanding of the legal system.
- It may also assess your communication skills, reasoning ability, and personality traits.
- The examiners will ask you about your legal knowledge, understanding of legal concepts, and ability to apply them to practical scenarios.
- If you belong to the general category, you must secure a minimum of 50% marks in viva-voce to be eligible for being recommended for an appointment to the Delhi Judiciary Service.
- If you belong to the reserved category, you must secure at least 45% marks to be eligible for the final selection.

The authorities will add marks secured in the main examination and viva-voce to calculate the aggregate for the final merit list.
